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from public servants and other experts in Southeast Asia, Latin America, Africa, and the Caucasus and then apply the concepts they learn to additional case studies.

The course's online platform will support team creation and collaboration, allowing reformers, policy makers, and scholars from around the world to engage in discussion about core problems leaders face, solutions they have tried, and strategies for adapting those solutions on the ground.

With eight working sessions, the course will run from the end of January through April 7. Participants who complete the course work, will receive a Statement of Accomplishment. The course is free but not for Princeton University credit.

Innovations for Successful Societies (ISS) helps public servants, policy makers, and scholars share institution-building strategies that work in especially challenging contexts. Interview-based case studies facilitate these exchanges and provide a basis for scholarly research. To date, ISS has published 140 case studies and 370 interviews, all of which are available free online. Governments use the materials to learn from each other, inspire discussion in their ranks, and recall the steps they took to implement a reform. Universities and training programs use the case studies in the classroom to engage students in the operational and strategic aspects of public sector reform.

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
